# Message from the President & Chief Executive Officer and Board Chair

Campbellford Memorial Hospital continues to strive for excellence in all that we do. Our focus is about providing the best possible patient experience by ensuring our patients can access programs tailored to their needs closer to home while providing for the best use of the public funding we receive. It's a story defined by major milestones and what we've achieved together as we focus on the delivery of our strategic plan.

We're pleased to share with you our achievements accomplished over the past 12 months supporting our strategic goals. Here are some highlights:

We are continuing to pursue organizational efficiency, ensuring we are fiscally sustainable, and making key investments in areas that lead to greater returns. In 2014/15 we:

- Granted surgical privileges to two orthopaedic surgeons, who are now performing orthopaedic procedures such as arthroscopy. The addition of this service supports the hospital's intent to do more procedures locally for a broader community with the same or similar resources.
- Developed a partnership between CMH and Community Care Northumberland. CMH is now providing support to Community Care Northumberland in the areas of finance, payroll and human resources. The hospital has a history of working collaboratively with Community Care Northumberland and this new shared services agreement provides both organizations with an opportunity to maximize its resources while continuing to focus on program and service delivery.
- Initiated a master planning process based on the short, medium and long-term needs of our community and the hospital's current ability to meet those needs. This plan contemplates redevelopment of the existing hospital physical plant.
- Sustained the financial health of the hospital, concluding our fiscal year in a surplus position of \$14,343.

We are ensuring safe quality care and service excellence for our patients – both now and in the future. We are serving the needs of a growing population of older adults with Senior Friendly Hospital initiatives. This includes:

- The introduction of a Trent Hills GAIN clinic. GAIN teams provide specialized care to support frail older adults living at home, including retirement residences with multiple complex medical problems including cognitive impairment, decreased function, falls or risk of falls, impaired mobility, incontinence and /or multiple medications. Frail older adults experiencing changes in support needs, safety concerns, psychological and mental health concerns or frequent health service usage will benefit from the services offered by their local GAIN team.
- The adoption of the Palliative and Therapeutic Harmonization (PATH) approach to care for assessing frail, older adults who visit the ER or are admitted to the hospital for treatment. The PATH approach to patient treatment is ultimately about giving patients and their family's time and space to make complex health care decisions that protect their best interests and quality of life.

We are continuing to recruit and retain the best people, while investing in their professional development with a focus on excellence every day. We are building the capacity and expertise of our team by:

- Offering a variety of courses focused on best practices in patient care for our nursing staff and supporting our managers in becoming better coaches.
- Continuing to reinforce best practices in safety for both patients and staff and offer workshops to team members to support innovation, diversity and wellness.

## Patient Safety is at the Heart of Hospital's Responsibility

Derek Nice's expertise in quality and safety has likely benefitted many touched by the aerospace industry. Campbellford Memorial Hospital's team members and patients are also benefitting from his expertise given his commitment as a volunteer on the hospital's Board of Directors since 2007 – where his leadership and experience in the areas of quality and safety are making a difference in patient care.

Calling Campbellford home, Nice is the CEO of Consilium Technica, a Canadian company that provides consulting, technical planning and marketing services to aerospace Maintenance, Repair and Overhaul's, aircraft lessors, airlines and wQuality Committees for CMH. He is also the former CMH Board Chair and the former Chair of the Finance/Audit Committee.

While serving as the hospital's Board Chair from 2011 – 2013, Nice was instrumental in the establishment of CMH's Quality Committee, "I was heavily involved in establishing the Quality Committee's mandate and terms of reference, responding to changes in legislation that was impacting safety and quality in the health care sector. My history in quality and safety with the aerospace industry was helpful at that time," he explains.

As part of the Ministry of Health and Long-term Care's Excellent Care for All Act, 2010, all Ontario hospitals are required to have Quality Improvement Plans. The Excellent Care for All Act is intended to foster a culture of continuous improvement in health care, where the needs of patients come first. The Excellent Care for All Act requires that every year, health care organizations like CMH develop a Quality Improvement Plan for the following fiscal year and make that plan available to the public.

"Patient safety goes to the heart of CMH's responsibility and commitment to look after the welfare of a patient. Our commitment is about providing a healing environment free of risk of further harm resulting from a hospital stay. The foundation of our hospital is providing the kind of care that people really need when they need it most," Nice explains.

Nice is proud of the team at Campbellford Memorial Hospital (CMH), noting their achievements and commitment in the area of patient safety, however he says: "Quality and safety is about continuous improvement. Our job is never done."

Nice believes that CMH is an instrumental part of the Campbellford community, providing a network of services acting as a hub of health care in the community.

"We are unique in how we bring together and integrate all of the health services that our community needs so people don't have to trek into the city to access those same services. We are working with other health care providers to provide a seamless continuum of care and the kind of services required by our community close to home," he says.

CMH's Board of Directors approves a Quality Improvement Plan for the hospital each fiscal year and measures its progress against specific measures and targets each quarter.

This has proved to be a great advantage to our hospitalist program, as we can now do our own assessment summaries on hospitalized patients, with support from Dr. Donald Doell, a geriatrician in Peterborough.

Our integrated palliative care program functions well with Dr. Kelly Parks as our palliative care lead physician. She sees patients in the Bridge Hospice, at home and here at Campbellford Memorial Hospital. Some of the physicians manage their own palliative patients, but will also refer to Dr. Parks.

Our surgical program runs well with Dr. Sue Chue Lam as the Chief of Surgery. With Jan Raine's help we now have two orthopedic surgeons doing arthroscopies here at CMH.

Peterborough Regional Health Centre is our referral hospital. We strengthened our ties with them in the past year for the purpose of improving quality of care provided here.

The physician group agreed on a huge change in how we practice in the hospital. Instead of each physician seeing their own patients in the hospital every day, we now have one physician seeing all the patients in hospital for one week at a time. Handover of hospital patients occur on Fridays. That means that we could all increase our clinic hours in the weeks that we do not have to be in the hospital. So far all the doctors agree that this was a positive change. The nursing staff also find this to be an improved system.

Dr. Mahim and Abid Raza are now providing echocardiography services here at CMH.

Dr. Nana Hou was welcomed back to Campbellford in 2014, this time as a fully-fledged physician. Nana was one of our residents and we could not be more happy to have had her join our team.

Dr. Jamie Reid joined us in April 2015. He worked in Toronto for many years, but has some roots in Warkworth and resides there, although he is working at Hillside Clinic. He is a wonderful addition to the team as well. Jamie replaced Dr. Lansing who wanted to expand her practice more into the Emergency Department.

Dr. Jeff Parker (GP anaesthetist) and Dr. Anne Parker (ER) will join us for one year, starting in July.

A lot of hard work went into our goal of providing quality of care at Campbellford Memorial Hospital. Thank you for your support.

# Campbellford Memorial Hospital's Palliative Program Providing Compassionate End of Life Care and Support for Patients and Families

Providing end of life care in a compassionate and warm setting is important to the team at Campbellford Memorial Hospital. Our team is committed to providing patients and their families experiencing this difficult time with understanding in a competent and supportive environment.

For example, we now have a Quiet Room for family and friends of loved ones receiving palliative or end of life care at the hospital. The Quiet Room is a place of rest and respite for individuals providing support to loved ones who are dying. It is a private, comfortable space where people can have a "time-out" from respite care to experience their grief and be vulnerable – away from the hustle and noises expected in a busy hospital environment.

Establishing the Quiet Room at Campbellford Memorial Hospital is another example of the best practices the hospital is adopting to ensure local patients and their families received the right care in the right place at the right time. The hospital is partnering with Community Care Access Centre, Trent Hills Family Health Team, Community Care Northumberland, and Bridge Hospice to provide a "wrap around" service to provide the best support for patients who are approaching end of life and their families. For example patients with a palliative diagnosis are assessed daily to make sure they get the right level of care close to home and in the right place.

In 2014, CMH adopted the Palliative and Therapeutic Harmonization (PATH) approach to care for assessing frail, older adults who visit the ER or are admitted to the hospital for treatment. The PATH approach to patient treatment is ultimately about giving patients and their families' time and space to make complex health care decisions that protect their best interests and quality of life.

"The goal of PATH is to help patients and families choose a blend of therapeutic and palliative measures that will best preserve an individual's quality of life in their remaining time," says Kerry Shudall, CMH Clinical Services Manager: "The majority of frail older adults suffer from complex, interacting medical illness. By understanding the full scope of their conditions, care plans are developed providing patients and their families with an understanding of their condition and the opportunity to end their life with dignity."

Thanks to community support and the gifts shared through the *Flourish Campaign*, Campbellford Memorial Hospital's Palliative Care Program and the team's commitment to compassionate care is just another example of how we are making a difference to patients and their families during difficult life experiences. Consider these words shared in a letter to the team at Campbellford Memorial Hospital from the Freeman Family, who lost their father to cancer in the summer of 2014:




